<u>''SOS'' (SAVE OUR SHAPE) - CAMP COUNTDOWN</u>

An "SOS" (Save Our Shape) Camp is being planned for youth ages 12 to 17 (both boys and girls) in the North Central and Northwestern Districts, between the dates of June 28 and June 30, 1982 at Camp Caroway in Asheboro. The purpose of the camp is to help overweight youth develop good eating habits, and at the same time, lose weight safely. In addition, emphasis will be placed on helping youth of normal weight maintain that weight. Other topics that will be addressed during Camp Countdown include calculating the number of calories to lose one or two pounds per week, clothing to flatter the overweight figure, dancersize and taking the calories out of food.

We are especially excited that Dr. Robert Senior, Specialist in Adolescent Medicine, from Chapel Hill will be a speaker at the Camp, addressing the topic of Anorexia Nervosa, Drugs and Alcohol, and their relationship to Weight Control. In addition to educational sessions, time for fun and fellowship will be incorporated into the schedule each day.

The cost of the Camp per person is \$70.00. For more information about the Camp, please contact the Foods and Nutrition Agent in your county. Registration for the Camp will be on a first-come, first-serve-basis and will be limited to 100 youth. The registration deadline is May 10, 1982.

CORE EXHIBIT FOR 4-H LEADER TRAINING MEETING

Core Exhibits or 4-H merchandise for display and evaluation at state, area, and 4-H local leader training meetings are available for loan in 1982.

Each exhibit consists of 115 4-H items most used by local leaders. This includes new items and items that are representative of the quality of 4-H merchandise such as jewelry and trophies, etc. A hook stand and sign complete the exhibit. All items are easily laid out for display on a table. Thus, it is easy to set up and return. National Council will pay postage both ways.

We thank all who used these exhibits which were offered in 1979, 1980, and 1981 on an experimental basis. They have definitely increased the use of the emblem and the visibility of 4-H.

These exhibits came into being based on research showing that three times as many people will buy items if they can <u>see and feel</u> the items over the group who will buy from just seeing pictures of the items in a catalog or ad. You can use this fact to multiply the use of the 4-H emblem and the visibility of 4-H in your counties, as local leaders will spend their own money to buy 4-H items they can see and feel.

Because of the tax exempt status of all organizations involved, sales of items sent in the Core Exhibit is prohibited.

This exhibit was displayed at the Annual Extension Conference in November, 1981. An order form is enclosed in the 4-H Coordinators' newsletter. Each exhibit contains approximately \$500 worth of merchandise. Therefore, there is a limited number of exhibits on loan. So we advise you to reserve yours early if interested. Only Extension personnel may order and be responsible for the exhibits.




