4-H ADMISSION CEREMONY

Have you held a special admission ceremony for your new 4-H club members? If not, try this one in January.

Many a 4-H Club member has been stimulated to greater effort and achievement by the experiences and opportunities made possible through 4-H Club work. A brief summary of some of the basic principles of 4-H Club work at the time new members are admitted may aid considerably in developing an appreciation of its values. Therefore, this brief ceremony seems especially appropriate at the time new members are enrolled in a 4-H Club.

Suggestions: The guide takes the candidate or candidates for 4-H Club membership to the front of the room, where the officers are standing behind a table on which an American flag and a 4-H flag have been placed.

President: To you who are about to become a member of the 4-H Clubs of America, we, as active members of (club name), sharing responsibilities in the carrying out of our 4-H program, wish to inquire as to your earnestness in becoming a 4-H member. Have you selected a 4-H project and returned a 4-H enrollment card signed by your parents?

Candidate: I have.

Vice President: Before becoming a 4-H member, we feel that you should become acquainted with the organization and the purposes of the 4-H Clubs. The 4-H Clubs are a part of the Cooperative Extension Service. This Service is under the cooperative direction of the United States Department of Agriculture, the State Colleges of Agriculture, and the county Extension organizations. 4-H Clubs are organized to help us to become better citizens in a democracy by teaching us how to work and play together; by guiding us in solving our own problems and those of the home and community; by giving us an opportunity to learn better methods of farming and home-making; by assisting us in demonstrating to others what we have learned; by giving us an understanding and appreciation of country life; and by aiding us in rendering service in our homes, on our farms, and in our communities. In addition, our 4-H Club program provides us, as rural young people, an opportunity to do our full part in working together for better world understanding.

Secretary: Our 4-H emblem is a green four-leaf clover, with a white "H" on each leaf, standing for the development of the Head, Heart, Hands, and Health.

2. Joining with friends for work, fun, and fellowship.
3. Learning to live in a changing world.
4. Choosing a way to earn a living.
5. Producing food and fiber for home and market.
6. Creating better homes for better living.
7. Conserving nature's resources for security and happiness.
8. Building health for a strong America.

9. Sharing responsibilities for community improvement.
10. Serving as citizens in maintaining world peace.

Our 4-H Club Creed is:

I believe in 4-H Club work for the opportunity it will give me to become a useful citizen.

I believe in the training of my HEAD for the power it will give me to think, to plan, and to reason.

I believe in the training of my HEART for the nobleness it will give me to become kind, sympathetic and true.

I believe in the training of my HANDS for the ability it will give me to be helpful, useful, and skillful.

I believe in the training of my HEALTH for the strength it will give me to enjoy life, to resist disease, and to work efficiently.

I believe in my country, my State, and my community, and in my responsibility for their development.

In all these things I believe, and I am willing to dedicate my efforts to their fulfillment.

Our 4-H Citizenship Pledge:
