SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

4-H agents in certain counties need to be aware of a new scholarship which may be a unique opportunity for 4-H members. Murphy Farms, Inc., has established an endowment in the N. C. State University Alumni Association to provide scholarship(s) for students pursuing undergraduate degrees in Animal Science or Agricultural Economics at N. C. State. The amount of the award will be \$3,000 per year with the potential for renewal for four years. The amount of the award and the renewability feature puts this scholarship in the class with the highest scholarships provided at any university. The subject matter requirement should mean that some of our 4-H members will be leading candidates. Recipients are limited to students from 20 North Carolina counties (Bladen, Chatham, Columbus, Craven, Duplin, Edgecombe, Franklin, Greene, Johnston, Lenoir, Martin, Nash, Onslow, Pender, Pitt, Rockingham, Rowan, Sampson, Wayne, Wilson). To be considered the student must have some demonstrated financial need. With the sould and the same location and need criteria met, first preference will go to the student with the greatest demonstrated academic merit.

> There is no particular application process. Students should indicate on their application for undergraduate admission that they are interested in financial aid. They should also indicate that they plan to enroll in SALS Animal Science or Agricultural Economics. It may not hurt to also include a cover letter which specifically mentions the scholarship.

I hope you will make 4-H'ers meeting the appropriate criteria aware of this opportunity. Please remember that such a prestigious award will require the recipient to possess superior academic credentials.

The Student Conservation Association has a program ASSOCIATION for high school aged youth to join work groups. For the fifth year, the National Gardening Association is offering grants to assist in the development of community gardening projects.

Seventy-five youth and school groups and 75 older citizen groups and organizations serving the disabled will be awarded the grants.

Grant packages include seeds, tools, garden supplies, programming information and gardening literature.

Any youth, retiree or disabled gardening group of 15 or more which has not received a National Gardening Association grant in the past may apply. Existing as well as first-year projects will be considered, but individual home gardeners are not eligible.
