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### 4-H DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM CLARIFICATION

A number of individuals and groups requested that we examine the demonstration program to try to eliminate some recurrent problems.

Enclosed are ten copies of the revised 4-H publication which serves as an agent and volunteer reference on "4-H Presentations." This terminology is used to clarify the role of both 4-H demonstrations and 4-H illustrated talks. Each year there seems to be a number of questions surrounding the definitions of each and the validity of the illustrated talk. We hope this publication will reinforce the role of both in club-level educational programs, and place the emphasis in competitive situations on the experience for the child. The publication is mimeographed at this time for expediency purposes, and on white paper for ease in duplicating.

Actually, little is being changed, since illustrated talks have been allowed in the past, although tradition and the language of our literature emphasizes the value of the demonstration method. Because of this emphasis, many people have assumed that youths who give an illustrated talk should be disqualified. We hope that the present materials will not minimize the teaching value of the demonstration method, but will legitimize illustrated talks as acceptable modes of communicating subject matter for some youths. You will also note changes in the scoresheet which we hope will alleviate some concerns. The materials have been reviewed by leaders, agents, and specialists. The publication "Judging 4-H Demonstrations" will also be changed.

Certainly, the human factor inherent in activities of this type will not eliminate all problems; however, we hope that this clarification will eliminate some of the definitional questions which have been troublesome to some specialists, judges, competitors, agents, and parents.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE WORK PROGRAM OFFERS RESOURCE ALTERNATIVES

Have more jobs to do than available resources? Perhaps the community Service Work Program can help meet your resource needs. The Division of Victim and Justice Services of the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety is charged with the responsibility of administering a state-wide community service work program. Initially designed as a sentencing alternative for DWI offenders, the program was expanded in 1984 to include other types of offenders. The program operates in each of North Carolina's Judicial Districts under the direction of a local non-paid advisory board headed by the Chief District Court Local staff includes program managers, Judge. program coordinators, and in some districts, assistant coordinators. An address list of personnel is enclosed for your convenience.

The purposes and goals of community service work are to: punish persons for illegal acts, perform restitution to society for public expenses resulting from the crime, deter the defendant and others from further criminal acts, and help the offender rehabilitate himself/herself.

In brief, the program places into community agencies offenders who have been convicted of DWI or other

COMMUNITY SERVICE WORK PROGRAM OFFERS RESOURCE ALITERNATIVES (continued) non-violent crimes (usually first offenders). Community service time of 24, 48, or 72 hours is usually required of these types of offenders. Program coordinators conduct an extensive interview with offenders to determine skills which can be matched with recipient agencies. Recipient governmental and nonprofit agencies utilize the services of the offender, supervise the work experience, and complete necessary reports which provide accountability to the court system.

The possibilities for community service work in your program are very broad. The effectiveness of this program in meeting some of the resource needs of your program will be largely dependent upon the relationship you are able to develop with local program coordinators, the type of work desired, the results achieved, and the availability of sufficient numbers of offenders to meet the needs of a number of recipient agencies.

Some possibilities for utilization of workers (dependent upon skills of offenders) include: exhibit construction, office work, developing educational program materials, teaching workshops, manual labor in preparation for activities, member data management record-keeping, making costumes or other props, field work, service work such as soil sample collection, etc. Counties with 4-H camp facilities may use workers in camp maintenance.

You may wish to meet with your judicial district community service program manager or coordinator to discuss the program, relationships, and regulations (see enclosed contact list). Keep me informed of your progress, particularly any problems, successes, and unique utilization strategies.

A nationwide poll last fall of 1,761 people showed that 4-H does have a positive effect on the lives of individuals involved in the program. The study, headed by Dr. Howard Ladewig, program evaluation specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, polled randomly selected samples of former 4-H members, members of other youth organizations and vouth not involved in any organized group. The key finding of the survey was that former 4-H members are more active in community affairs, particularly in leadership roles. 4-H also tends to have family ties, with former 4-H members indicating their children are participating in 4-H to a large degree. 4-H members gave higher rankings to personal development, knowledge, leadership and coping skills experiences than did former members of other groups.
