4-H "TRY" TRAINING OF TRAINERS 1987 The last opportunity for counties to send a Trainer Team to TOT and have expenses covered by the Kellogg Grant is coming up in January.

If you would like to have a trained team of teens and adults in your county:

- Recruit a team of three to four interested individuals, one of whom must be their adult coach.
- Decide on the date and location which best fits your team's schedule.

3. Call Susan Matney as soon as possible, before January 5, to register your team.

Meals and overnight lodging for your four member Trainer Team (one of which must be an adult coach) will be covered through the Kellogg Grant.

Your county's TRY Trainer Team will then be prepared to conduct a county level TRY Retreat or Lock-In for TRY Teams. TRY Teams can teach new audiences of six to eleven year olds and enjoy the responsibility and trust placed in them.

1987 N.C. VOLUNTEER LEADERS' CONFERENCE

Volunteer 4-H Leaders' Association and Program Chairman for the 1987 Conference, has worked very diligently in developing a program that should be of interest to any 4-H volunteer leader in North Carolina. The theme is "Our Health to Better Living." There will be basic workshops for the new volunteer leader and extended learning workshops for those leaders with lots of tenure. Encourage your volunteers to take advantage of this excellent training opportunity.

Informational brochures with registration forms attached are enclosed in this newsletter packet. The cost for delegates who preregister will be \$16.00 for both days. If they attend the Saturday conference only the cost is \$10.00. Delegates who do not preregister but come and pay at the door will be charge \$18.00. The banquet Saturday night at McKimmon Center with State 4-H Council delegates is an additional \$6.00. Note that this event is optional and only available to those who preregister for it. They will be given tickets to attend. Also note that cancellations need to be made by 9:00 a.m. Friday, February 6, in order to receive a refund of preregistration money.

The Leaders' Association is going to raffle another Bob Timberlake print at the conference. A sheet of tickets is enclosed for you to copy. Encourage leaders to sell them to anyone in the county. The winner does not have to be present at the drawing. They hope to raise \$1,200 with the print along with the other two items. Ticket stubs and money need to be turned in at the conference during registration. There will be a raffle table set up to collect the money and keep a record of all advance sales by counties. They plan to reward the county with the highest presales in some way during the conference.

NCSU NAMES DEVELOPMENT Dr. Glenn Chappell, Jr., associate professor in the OFFICER FOR AGRICULTURE Department of Marketing at East Carolina University and president of Carolina Marketing and Public Relations Associates in Greenville, has been named to

succeed Robert N. Wood in the NCSU Development Program. The position became vacant in June upon Wood's death.

Chappell will serve as a Development Office staff member for the School of Agriculture and Life Sciences as executive director of the North Carolina Agriculture Foundations, N. C. Dairy Foundation, N. C. Tobacco Foundation and 4-H Development Fund.

At ECU Chappell teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in marketing, public relations and strategic market planning. His firm specializes in marketing research and public relations assistance for business firms primarily in Eastern North Carolina.

Before returning to North Carolina, Chappell was chief economist and head of the research department of the Tobacco Tax Council in Richmond, VA.
