

4-H demonstrations and illustrated talks are two very effective methods of sharing information. Under the umbrella word, presentations, these methods have played a vital role in 4-H. People learn faster and remember longer if they see, hear and do. Perhaps the greatest value of presentations is to the 4-H'er who plans, prepares and presents to an audience.

Presentations should be viewed as an extension of the member's project and not as an end unto itself. Young 4-H'ers should be encouraged to give presentations in their clubs. A one minute spot may be the extent of the presentation; but that experience will get the member on his feet and in an active teacher role. In order for even a minute presentation to be prepared and presented, information must be gathered, organized, understood and shared in a logical sequence.

Planning and preparation of presentations is not the solo job of 4-H personnel. County subject matter agents and extension volunteers are important players of the presentation team. The expertise and experiences of these people are invaluable resources as 4-H'ers develop their presentations.



Cooperative Extension Work in Agriculture and Home Economics A&T and N.C. State Universities, 100 Counties, and U.S. Department of Agriculture, Cooperating. As presentation planning becomes a focus, a review of support materials may prove helpful:

1) The "4-H Presentation" guide contains a thorough discussion of presentations from one minute to an hour. A step-by-step procedure walks the reader through the development of a demonstration or illustrated talk. The main objective of the guide is to underline the real value of presentations and serve as a model for their development. Presently this publication should be requested from the state 4-H office.

2) "Food For Thought", (4-HF-13-35) deals specifically with foods presenta-The design, purpose and technique of foods presentatiuons has some tions. uniqueness. However, the publication discusses some excellent pointers when preparing for any show and tell demonstration regardless of subject focus.

3) "Your 4-H Presentation" (4-H 0-1-7) supports the why, who, where and how questions. It also has a list of presentation ideas that covers a variety of project areas. Each of the publications has strengths and as a group provide an excellent base to begin in the activity.

4) An additional tool is a collection of state winning presentations that have been video taped over several years. Both junior and senior presentations are included. The 1987 tape contains junior presentation in Landscaping, Fruits and Vegetables and Open Class. These provide a good base for discussions of technique, subject matter organization and evaluation. All tapes are available from the Ag Communication Media Library.

Perhaps one of the most valuable resources will be county subject matter agents and extension volunteers. The experience, expertise and concern for the extension youth audience of all county staff is vital to the success or presentations if they are to meet the purpose and objectives of the activity. Presentations represent a union of subject matter and personal development needing the equal support of both partners. They should be classed as a learning and teaching tool; thus, placing the competitive activity as an extension of the program for those to whom competition is an aspiration.

5. The deadline for getting the material to Human Development is 9/20/88. Address reports to Human Development, Box 7605, NCSU, Raleigh, NC 27695-7605.

6. Judging will be done by a team including a 4-H member, a representative from AARP, and a retired person.

7. The most impressive records are those that show meaningful activities over a period of months rather than one activity for older adults. "Adopt a Grandparent" is a good example.

Many older adults will welcome an opportuity to be friends to your 4-H'ers, and most young people need a better understanding of older adults.
