COMMUNICATING 4-H

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LEADERSHIP

The importance of volunteer effort in 4-H as the mainstay of the program cannot be overstated. The roles of volunteers in the North Carolina 4-H program vary, but ultimately the volunteer is the one that helps the child. Thus the Extension Agent, 4-H, becomes a leader of leaders of leaders. The best designed program of any organization can only be as effective as the individual that leads it. "It depends on the leader", an often used quotation, is so important to the effectiveness of the 4-H Program. The leader is --- the Extension 4-H agent. The Extension 4-H Agent is the key to the leadership others portray. Some may say administrator, manager, professional, even supervisor or executive, but, actually, Extension workers must be leaders.

I recently read the book The Leadership Challenge, How to Get Extraordinary Things Done in Organization by James M. Kauzes and Barry Z. Posser. This is an excellent book on leadership! Basically, the book addresses the following: 1) knowing what leadership is really about, 2) challenging the process, 3) inspiring a shared vision, 4) enabling others to act, 5) modeling the way, 6) encouraging from the heart, and 7) the beginning of leadership. Sounds like 4-H, doesn't it? It seems to me that there is a great lesson just in these topics and that they perhaps make up a good check-list for leadership in youth development.

The book states that in any organization, the successful achievement of competitive goals requires that managers at all levels accept the challenge to become leaders - leaders who can bring people together to accomplish the extraordinary. Yet many people still believe that there is something mysterious about leadership that alludes all but a gifted few. Leadership is not the private preserve of a few charismatic men and women, but a learnable set of practices that virtually anyone



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can master. It is in giving that the leader becomes stronger. It is directing the action and power of others that becomes the challenge.

This book discusses ten observable, learnable practices of leadership. These are: 1) search for opportunity, 2) experiment and take risk, 3) envision the future, 4) enlist others, 5) foster collaboration (teamwork), 6) strengthen others, 7) set the example, 8) plan small wins, 9) recognize individual contributions, and 10) celebrate accomplishments.

While each practice is critical, I emphasize numbers one and two. Often opportunities are overlooked in 4-H. We must be assertive in our work, instead of just doing the things that are placed before us. The second practice is equally important. Life is a game of risk-taking. Show me an individual that is willing to take a risk and I'll show you a person that will become a leader. The difference between a worker and a leader is that the leader can envision the future. Don't worry about tomorrow but be concerned with where you, your program and your clientele will be ten years from now. If you are a leader you must involve others and foster teamwork. It is important to all to be successful. Plan success for yourself and the people you lead. Recognize yourself for a job well done, be proud and praise others that do well.

We have been placed in a leadership position - it is up to us to become a leader of leaders. Leading and involving others in the things they need to have a productive and satisfying life is a worthwhile goal for all. To help people help themselves is of the highest calling for men and women.

BICYCLE GRANTS

We have received additional funding from the Governor's Highway Safety Program. This grant has two parts: the development of a bicycle members which will follow manual videotape as well as cover materials not addressed by the tape. If you have ideas or materials you are using locally and would like to share them, please send them or let me know. The second aspect of the grant is \$6,000 which will be used to give counties a start in bicycle programming. Last year the average award was approximately \$300.00 with 20 counties participating. In this second cycle, preference will be given to those not funded; but all are encouraged to apply.

To receive a grant, you must agree to:

- Write a proposal which uses the complete bicycle education program as a part of your program
- Administer the test at the end of the modules covered as a pre and post test.
- Compile and report the average pre and post test score.
- 4. Keep track of receipts and submit

at program completion. 5. Complete programming by September 30. 1989

For your county to be considered for funding, please complete the enclosed proposal form and return to me by January 31, 1989. You will be notified in early February of the status of your proposal. Many of the counties who participated this past year thought the funds allowed them to try some things they may not have had the resources to try. Let's keep a great thing going.

INTERNATIONAL UNDERSTANDING BEGINS IN THE 4-H HOME IN NORTH CAROLINA

Four-H Club members and their families now have an opportunity for a cross-cultural experience with a young person from Costa Rica.

The Central American Peace Scholarship Program (CAPS), sponsored by the U.S. Foreign Aid program and the Government of Costa Rica, is planning to assign 10 Costa Rican youth between the ages of 15 and 19 to North Carolina in the summer of 1989. order to do so, we will need to identify at least 10 host families. Costa Rican Government requests that these families be active in 4-H Club The visiting youth are expected to return to Costa Rica and commit themselves to the country's 4-S program, an organization patterned after the 4-H club program, for a period of two years.

Each visitor will live with an American family and will actively participate in 4-H as well as other school, church and community organizations. The youths expected arrival in the State is around mid-July and with departure around mid-February. They will enroll in the local school system and their grades will count toward their school work in Cost Rica.

Members of the N.C. International 4-H Programs Alumni Association plan to provide orientation for host families and Extension personnel in May.

We have several families that indicated a willingness to act as host family for the 1988 program—a program that never got off the ground. We will offer them an opportunity to host a CAPS exchangee in 1989.

1987-88 4-H ENROLLMENT

The North Carolina 4-H Enrollment experienced significant growth this year due to 4-H CARES and School Enrichment.

Youth participating in all delivery modes is 162,497 with duplications and 131,840 with duplications eliminated. This represents an increase of approximately 46,000 4-H'ers. Other youth worked with numbered 48,203. Our grand total of youth worked with in North Carolina (duplications eliminated) equals 180,043.

Twenty-six thousand three hundred twenty-two (26,322) volunteers were reported which represents an increase of 3,574 from last year.

The number of learning experiences also increased from last year with 358,178 experiences reported (+78,215).
