

4-H PROJECT REGULATIONS

1. Age eligibility is established as of January 1, 1982. To participate in 1982 the 4-H member's birthdate must fall between January 1, 1963 and December 31, 1972.
2. To be eligible for district and state awards, the 4-H member must:
 - a. Have been enrolled in 4-H for no less than one (1) year.
 - b. Be enrolled during the current year in the program in which he is competing.
3. District winners may be under 14 years of age.
4. To be declared a state winner, the 4-H member must:
 - a. Be at least 14 years old and not have passed his 19th birthday by December 31, 1981. Participants in Dairy Calf, Dairy Industry, Pre-Teen Canning and Early-Teen Canning may be less than 14.
 - b. Have completed at least (1) year of 4-H but preferably three (3) or more years including the current year, except in the projects listed in (a) above.
5. A 4-H member may submit cumulative records for district and state competition in not more than 2 programs during the same year. A 1981 project record is required when the record is submitted in March, 1982, for district and state judging. A 1982 project record may also be included to show work done in January and February 1982.
6. If a creditable project record is not submitted in a project area, no winner will be declared.
7. A 4-H member may be declared a state winner in only one 4-H project during the same year (demonstrations are excluded). A 4-H member declared a state cumulative record program winner is not eligible to represent the county in the district or state Fashion Revue.
8. A state winner cannot compete again on any level in the same project.
9. A previous state winner in a project which did not provide a trip to National 4-H Congress may participate and be declared a state winner in other awards programs.
10. A 4-H member who has been awarded a trip to National 4-H Congress may not participate in any other project awards program that offers a trip to National 4-H Congress.
11. Alternates who are awarded a state award to replace the original state winner may not compete in the same project again. If the award was a trip to National 4-H Congress, that 4-H'er may not participate in National Congress again.
12. As of December 1, 1981, some donors had not renewed their support contracts or a donor had not yet been secured for some 1982 programs; therefore, should a donor not renew or be secured, the district award will be a certificate and the state award, \$50 Bond.
13. Bonds and most other state awards provided by state donors will be distributed in September, 1982. Awards provided by national donors will be distributed later.
14. A 4-H'er may decline a trip to National 4-H Congress and compete in other programs offering a trip in future years, if he notifies the State 4-H Office in writing at least 30 days prior to the date of National 4-H Congress.

Pre-teens must have birthdates falling on or between December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1970. Early teens must have birthdates falling on or between January 1, 1969 and December 31, 1968 (9 years old).
- (4) State award of \$150 is awarded only to those who use the funds toward expenses to compete in the National Junior Horticultural Association contest. To compete in the national contest, individuals must be 15 by December 31, 1981. If the state winner is under 15, he will receive a \$50.00 Savings Bond. A 4-H'er may receive these awards only once in his 4-H career.
- (5) Record books submitted as stated on sheet entitled "Fashion Revue -- Rules and Regulations."
- (6) Competition is conducted among 4-H'ers, 9 - 19 years of age. Four-H'ers may select any area of interest in international affairs and must submit the record, 4-H R-1-80, and a story of 1000 words or less to describe their activities.
- (7) The \$500 scholarship for peanut foods will be distributed in two parts: \$250 at the beginning of the 4-H'er's first and second semesters.
- (8) Tractor and Small Engines.

4-H DEMONSTRATION REGULATIONS*

- Age eligibility is established as of January 1, 1982.
- Any 4-H'er, ages 9-19 years, is eligible to be named a district or state winner if he is eligible to compete under the age eligibility established for the demonstration program. He must have reached his 9th birthday on or before December 31, 1981 and may not have passed his 19th birthday on or before December 31, 1981 except as stated in 4 below.
- Four-H members are not eligible, however, to participate in a district contest if by the date of the contest they will have completed a year of training beyond the high school level. "Year" is defined as "academic year" which usually is a period of only nine months. This rule applies to judging teams.
- Members in Automotive Skill Driving must be at least 16 years of age by the time of the contest and must not have passed their 19th birthday on or before December 31, 1981.
- A minimum of 5 minutes is recommended and a maximum of 12 minutes is allowed for demonstrations except Public Speaking (7 minutes), and Poultry Barbecue, Pork Cookery and Beef Char-Grill (2 hours). One point will be deducted from the participants's score for each minute the demonstration is over the time limit.
- Four-H members may compete for awards in no more than one demonstration program during any one year. The Talent Contest is not considered a demonstration program.
- It is desirable that participants in Poultry Barbecue, Pork Cookery and Beef Char-Grill not participate in the Talent Contest. However, if they do they should first report to and complete the cooking demonstration before participating in the Talent Contest. Someone should report early to the Talent Contest that the 4-H'ers will participate later.
- Each county is limited to a maximum of 10 minutes in the Talent Contest involving no more than 2 acts.
- A ribbon is given to every demonstrator except as stated below. The type of ribbon awarded is based upon the quality of the demonstration. Regardless of the type of ribbon awarded, one demonstrator in each demonstration category will be designated as the district winner and will be eligible to compete on the state level. The only exception to this rule is the Talent Contest in which only blue ribbons and participatory ribbons are awarded and only selected blue ribbon winners are invited to participate in the State 4-H Talent Show.

4-H Demonstration Regulations (continued)

10. A scholarship to North Carolina 4-H Congress is worth \$45.00 which covers the cost of registration, housing and one banquet meal. Other expenses are the responsibility of the recipient. To receive the scholarship, the 4-H'er must register for the full week of Congress.
11. Cash awards, either in full or in part, will not be given to district winners in lieu of the scholarship to attend North Carolina 4-H Congress.
12. When the winner cannot attend Congress or participate in the state demonstration contest, the award will be given to the alternate if the alternate attends Congress and participates in the demonstration contest.
13. Alternates who are awarded a trip or a state award to replace the state winner may not compete in the same demonstration program again.
14. Four-H members may continue to compete in a particular demonstration category until declared state winner. They are then no longer eligible to participate in the same program but may participate in others. The same demonstration can be repeated; however, the individual's personal development will be much greater if the demonstration is revised and improved.
15. For the purpose of competition in a demonstration category, a "team" may be composed of no more than two individuals except in the Talent Contest where there is no limit to the number of individuals that may compose a "team," and Dairy Bowl, where a team can be no more than three.
16. As of December 1, 1981, some donors had not renewed their support contracts or a donor had not been secured for 1982; therefore, should a donor not renew or be secured, the district award will be a certificate and the state award a \$50 Savings Bond for each winner.
