4-H CUMULATIVE RECORDS REGULATIONS

- Age eligibility is established as of January 1, 1989. To participate in 1989, the 4-H member must be nine years of age prior to January 1, 1989 and not have had his/her nineteenth birthday before January 1, 1989.
- 2. To be eligible for district and state awards, the 4-H member must:
 - a. Have been enrolled in 4-H for no less than one (1) year.
- b. Be enrolled during the current year in the program in which the 4-H'er is competing.
- 3. Junior level district and state winners must be between the ages of 9 and 13 as of January 1, 1989. Winners must have completed one or more years in the major project.
- 4. To participate in a senior level, the 4-H member must:
 - a. Be at least 14 years old and not have had his/her 19th birthday before January 1, 1989.
- b. Have completed at least (1) year of 4-H but preferably three (3) or more years including the current year,
- 5. A 4-H member may submit cumulative records for district and state competition in not more than 2 programs during the same year. There is no limit on the number of records a county can submit in any given project area.
- 6. Those program areas which offer the opportunity to compete for a national scholarship are indicated with an (N) following the project name. This information is based upon 1988 information and will be confirmed for 1989 programs in February, 1989. Please refer to the 1989 4-H Digest prepared by National 4-H Council for state, sectional and national trips.
- 7. If a creditable project record is not submitted in a project area, no winner will be declared.
- 8. A 4-H member may be declared a state winner in only one 4-H project during the same year (presentations are excluded). A 4-H member declared a state cumulative record program winner is not eligible to represent the county in the State Fashion Revue.
- 9. Should a 4-H member who submits a record for judging not wish to be considered for a state win, he/she should indicate by writing "Not Considered for State Win" in red ink on the National Report Form. The 4-H agent should also note the child's name and record area on the appropriate line of the Transmittal Form when submitted March 1.
- 10. If a state winner is offered and accepts a trip to National 4-H Congress as a state, sectional, or national winner and then turns the trip down, the winner cannot compete again in the same project.
- 11. A previous junior state winner cannot be declared a state winner a second time as a junior member in the same project area. He/she will be eligible in all other projects. He/she can be named senior state winner in the same winning project if he/she reached the age of 14 before January 1, 1989.
- A senior 4-H member who has been awarded a trip to National 4-H Congress may not participate in any other project awards program that offers a trip to National 4-H
 Congress.
- 13. Alternates who are awarded a state award (trip to National Congress) to replace the original state winner or as a second state winner may not compete in the same project again. If the senior state winner is not awarded or does not accept a trip to National 4-H Congress in sectional or national programs, they may be named state winner in the same project in subsequent years.
- 14. As of January 1, 1989, some donors had not renewed their support contracts or a donor had not yet been secured for some 1989 programs; therefore, should a donor not renew or be secured, the district award will be a certificate and the state award, \$50 Bond sponsored by the N.C. 4-H Development Fund.
- 15. Bonds and most other state awards provided by state donors will be distributed in September, 1989. Awards provided by national donors will be distributed later.
- 16. Any 4-H member who is selected as a national winner must attend National 4-H Congress in its entirety to receive his/her award.
- 17. Should a national awards program (project) be discontinued by National Council, that program will be continued as a state program for two years after it is discontinued nationally. If no state sponsorship is secured after the two year period, the program will be discontinued as a state program.
- 18. Project sponsorship is designated by a code letter which follows the project title. National sponsorship is designated with an "N". State sponsors are shown with an "S". Those projects that do not carry a guaranteed trip to National 4-H Congress are grouped together and ranked. The top ranked record winners are then awarded a trip to National 4-H Congress. These are designated with a "DF".

- (4) Canning records are due in State 4-H Office, c/o Rachel Kinlaw, Foods and Nutrition Department, Box 7605, Raleigh, North Carolina 27695-7605, postmarked by October 13, 1989, Pre-teens must be 9-11 years of age before January 1, 1989. Early teens must be 12 or 13 years of age before January 1, 1989.
- (5) State award of \$150 is awarded only to those who use the funds toward expenses to compete in the National Junior Horticultural Association contest. To compete in the national contest, individuals must be 15 by December 31 of the year of participation. If the state winner is under 15, he/she will receive a \$50.00 Savings Bond. A 4-H'er may receive sonosorship awards to no more than two NJHA conventions in his/her 4-H career.
- (6) Dairy Calf projects are submitted with a National 4-H Report Form and a county current year's project. All projects not adhering to this guideline will be ruled ineligible.
- (7) Record books submitted as stated on sheet entitled "Fashion Revue Rules and Regulations."
- (8) The \$500 scholarship for peanut foods will be distributed in two parts: \$250 at the beginning of the 4-H'er's first and second semesters.
- (9) Tractor and Small Engines.
- (10) Automotive and Petroleum Power state winning records will be judged to determine the best of the two records. The top record will then be submitted for National Competition in August.
- (11) To be selected as a trip winner, the 4-H'er must compete for and be named a Sectional Winner.

- 1. Age eligibility is established as of January 1, 1989.
- Any 4-H'er, ages 9-19 years, is eligible to compete and be named a district or state winner if he/she is eligible to compete under the age eligibility established for the presentation program.
- 3. The same presentation may be repeated from one year to the next; however, the individual's personal development will be much greater if the presentation is revised and improved.
- 4. A minimum of 5 minutes is recommended and a maximum of 12 minutes is allowed for presentations. Exceptions are a maximum time as follows: Public Speaking (7 minutes), Horse Public Speaking (10 minutes), and Chicken and Turkey Barbecue, Pork Cookery and Beef Char-Grill (2 hours). One point will be deducted from the participant's score for each minute the presentation is over the time limit.
- Four-H members may compete for awards in no more than one presentation program during any one year. "4-H Entertains Program" is not considered a presentation program.
- 6. It is desirable that participants in Chicken and Turkey Barbecue, Pork Cookery and Beef Char-Grill and Dairy Bowl not participate in the "4-H Entertains Program." However, if they do they should first report to and complete the cooking presentation before participating in the "4-H Entertains." Someone should report early to the 4-H Entertains Contest that the 4-H'ers will participate later.
- 7. Each county is limited to a maximum of 10 minutes in the "4-H Entertains Program" involving no more than 2 acts (Talent Contest).
- 8. A ribbon is given to every demonstrator except as stated below. The type of ribbon awarded is based upon the quality of the presentation. Regardless of the type of ribbon awarded, one presentation in each demonstration category will be designated as the district winner and will be eligible to compete on the state level. The only exception to this rule is the "4-H Entertains Program" in which only blue ribbons and participatory ribbons are awarded and only selected blue ribbon winners are invited to participate in the State "4-H Entertains Program."
- A scholarship to North Carolina 4-H Congress is worth \$50.00. A partial scholarship is worth \$25.00. Other expenses are the responsibility of the recipient. To receive the scholarship, the 4-H'er must register for the full week of Congress.
- 10. Cash awards, either in full or in part, will not be given to the district winners in lieu of the scholarship to attend North Carolina 4-H Congress.
- 11. When the winner cannot attend Congress or participate in the state presentation contest, the award will be given to the alternate if the alternate registers and attends Congress for the week and participates in the presentation contest.
- 12. Senior level district runners-up in presentations will be invited to participate in the state contest at 4-H Congress. In cases where a category allows 9-19 year olds to compete together, only those runners-up who are 14 years old or older on January 1, 1989 may compete as senior runners-up. There will be no scholarship available to Congress. Participants must notify the State 4-H Office, in writing, by July 6, 1989, to be eligible to participate.
- 13. Four-H members may continue to compete in a particular presentation category until declared state winner. An exception is made when alternates are awarded a trip to replace the state winner; they are then no longer eligible to participate in the same program but may participate in others.
- 14. For the purpose of competition in a presentation category, a "team" may be composed of no more than two individuals except in the "4-H Entertains" where there is no limit to the number of individuals that may compose a "team," and Dairy Bowl, where a team can be no more than three.
- 15. As of January 1, 1989, some donors had not renewed their support contracts or a donor had not been secured for 1989; therefore, should a donor not renew or be secured, the district award will be a certificate and the state award a \$50 Savings Bond for each winner sponsored by the N.C. 4-H Development Fund.

*It is recognized that all programs listed in this section are not pure presentations; however, for simplicity of categorizing programs for this handbook they have been listed here.
