- Age eligibility is established as of January 1, 1994. To participate in 1994, the 4-H member must be nine years of age prior to January 1, 1994 and not have had his/her nineteenth birthday before January 1, 1994. All categories are open to both junior and senior level 4-H'ers, unless otherwise indicated.
- To be eligible for district and state awards, the 4-H member must:
 a. Have been enrolled in 4-H for no less than one (1) year.
 - b. Be enrolled during the current year in the program in which the 4-H'er is competing.
- 3. Junior level district and state winners must be between the ages of 9 and 13 as of January 1, 1994. Winners must have completed one or more years in the major project.
- 4. To participate in a senior level, the 4-H member must:
 - a. Be at least 14 years old and not have had his/her 19th birthday before January 1, 1994.
 - b. Have completed at least one (1) year of 4-H but preferably three (3) or more years including the current year.
- 5. A 4-H member may submit cumulative records for district and state competition in not more than two programs during the same year. There is no limit on the number of records a county can submit in any given project area.
- Those program areas which offer the opportunity to compete for a national scholarship are indicated with an (N) following the project name. This information is based upon 1993 information and will be confirmed for 1994 programs in December, 1993. Please refer to the 1994 4-H Digest prepared by National 4-H Council for state, sectional and national trips.
- 7. If a creditable project record is not submitted in a project area, no winner will be declared.
- The listed state awards are provided for senior level (14 to 19 on or before January 1, 1994) participants. Unless otherwise indicated, junior winners will receive a certificate
 and ribbon.
- 9. A 4-H member may be declared a state winner in only one 4-H project during the same year (presentations are excluded). A 4-H member declared a state cumulative record program winner is not eligible to represent the county in the State Fashion Revue.
- 10. Should a 4-H member who submits a record for judging not wish to be considered for a state win, he/she should indicate by writing "Not Considered for State Win" in red ink on the National Report Form. The 4-H agent should also note the child's name and record area on the appropriate line of the computer disk when submitted March 1.
- 11. If a state winner is offered and accepts a trip to National 4-H Congress as a state winner and then turns the trip down, the winner cannot compete again in the same project. If the state winner does not go to National Congress, he/she can be renamed a state winner in future years.
- 12. A previous Junior state winner cannot be declared a state winner a second time as a junior member in the same project area. He/she will be eligible in all other projects. He/she can be named senior state winner in the same winning project if he/she reached the age of 14 before January 1, 1994.
- A senior 4-H member who has been awarded a trip to National 4-H Congress may not participate in any other project awards program that offers a trip to National 4-H
 Congress.
- 14. Alternates who are awarded a state award (trip to National Congress) to replace the original state winner or as a second state winner may not compete in the same project again.
- 15. As of December 1, 1993, some donors had not renewed their support contracts or a donor had not yet been secured for some 1994 programs; therefore, should a donor not renew or be secured, the district award will be a certificate and the state award, a \$50 bond sponsored by the N.C. 4-H Development Fund.
- 16. Bonds and most other state awards provided by state donors will be distributed in September, 1994. Awards provided by national donors will be distributed later.
- Those projects that do not carry a guaranteed trip to National 4-H Congress are grouped together and ranked. The top ranked record winners are then awarded a trip to National 4-H Youth Congress in Orlando, Florida.

- (1) For donor contact and address refer to the North Carolina 4-H Curriculum Guide. More complete information concerning all phases of the awards program is also included in the guide.
- (2) All state-winning senior Foods-Nutrition Projects will be judged against one another, and the top two will receive trips to National 4-H Youth Congress.
- (3) Canning records are due in the Department of 4-H Youth Development, c/o Foods and Nutrition Department, Box 7605, Raleigh, North Carolina 27695-7605, postmarked by October 15, 1994. Pre-teens must be 9 to 11 years of age before January 1, 1994. Early teens must be 12 to 13 years of age before January 1, 1994.
- (4) State award of \$150 is awarded only to those who use the funds toward expenses to compete in the National Junior Horticultural Association contest. To compete in the national contest, individuals must be 15 by December 31 of the year of participation. If the state winner is under 15, he/she will receive a \$50 savings bond. A +Her may receive sponsorship awards to no more than two NJHA conventions in his/her 4-H career.
- (5) Use National Junior Horticultural Association record keeping project rather than the Cumulative Record form.
- (6) Dairy Calf, Dairy/Dairy Industry, and Dairy Goat projects are submitted with a National 4-H Report Form, story, and pictures as are all other projects.
- (7) Record books submitted as stated on sheet entitled "Fashion Revue Rules and Regulations."
- (8) The \$500 scholarship for peanut foods will be distributed in two parts: \$250 at the beginning of the 4-H'er's first and second semesters.

LOCAL AND COUNTY PROGRAMS MAY INCLUDE PROJECTS IN ADDITION TO THOSE LISTED IN THE HANDBOOK. ALSO, ACHIEVEMENT CERTIFICATES MAY BE USED AS COUNTY AWARDS IN THESE PROGRAMS.

4-H PRESENTATION REGULATIONS*

- 1. Age eligibility is established as of January 1, 1994. To participate in 1994, the 4-H member must be nine years of age prior to January 1, 1994 and not have had his/her nineteenth birthday before January 1, 1994.
- 2. The same presentation may be repeated from one year to the next; however, the individual's personal development will be much greater if the presentation is revised and improved.
- 3. A minimum of 5 minutes is recommended and a maximum of 12 minutes is allowed for presentations. Exceptions are as follows: Public Speaking (7 minutes), Chicken Barbecue (2 hours), Turkey Barbecue (2 hours), Pork Cookery (2 hours), Beef Char-Grill (2 hours), Horse, Jr. (minimum 5 minutes; maximum 15 minutes; maximum 10 minutes; maximum 10 minutes; maximum 10 minutes; maximum 10 minutes), Horse Public Speaking, Jr. (minimum 4 minutes; maximum 10 minutes). One point will be deducted per judge for each minute under the minimum or over the maximum time in horse categories.
- 4. 4 -H members may compete for awards in no more than one presentation program during any one year. "4-H Entertains Program" is not considered a presentation program.
- 5. It is desirable that participants in Chicken and Turkey Barbecue, Pork Cookery, Beef Char-Grill, and Dairy Bowl not participate in the "4-H Entertains Program." However, if they do, they should first report to and complete the cooking presentation before participating in the "4-H Entertains." Someone should report early to the 4-H Entertains Contest that the 4-Her will participate later.
- 6. Each county is limited to a maximum of 10 minutes in the "4-H Entertains Program" involving no more than two acts (Talent Contest).
- 7. A County Winner ribbon is given to each participant. A ribbon and certificate are awarded the district winner and runner-up receives a ribbon only. One presentation in each presentation category will be designated as the district winner and will be eligible to compete on the state level. The only exception to this rule is the "4-H Entertains Program" in which only blue ribbons and participatory ribbons are awarded and only selected blue ribbon winners are invited to participate in the State "4-H Entertains Program."
- 8. A scholarship to North Carolina 4-H Congress is worth \$50 unless otherwise noted. A partial scholarship is worth \$25. Other expenses are the responsibility of the recipient. To receive the scholarship, the 4-Her must register part-time (Monday-Tuesday p.m.) or the full week of Congress.
- 9. Cash awards, either in full or in part, will not be given to the district winners in lieu of the scholarship to attend North Carolina 4-H Congress,
- 10. When the Junior or Senior winner cannot attend Congress or participate in the state presentation contest, the award will be given to the District runner-up if the District runner-up registers and attends Congress for the week and participates in the presentation contest.
- 11. Senior level district runners-up in presentations will be invited to participate in the state contest at 4-H Congress. There will be no scholarship available to Congress. Participants must notify the Department of 4-H Youth Development, in writing, by July 12, 1994, to be eligible to participate.
- 12. 4-H members may continue to compete in a particular presentation category until declared state winner. An exception is made when runners-up are awarded a trip to replace the state winner; they are then no longer eligible to participate in the same program but may participate in others.
- 13. For the purpose of competition in a presentation category, a "team" may be composed of no more than two individuals except in the "4-H Entertains" where there is no limit to the number of individuals that may compose a "team," and Dairy Bowl, where a team must be composed of two or three individuals.
- 14. As of January 1, 1994, some donors had not renewed their support contracts or a donor had not been secured for 1994, therefore, should a donor not renew or be secured, the district award will be a certificate and the state award a \$50 savings bond for each winner sponsored by the N.C. 4-H Development Fund.
