

Plan

- · Comfort and convenience in a small plan.
- · Three bedrooms, closets, complete bath, living room.
- · Kitchen-dining-family living combination.
- · Excellent L-Shaped kitchen arrangement.
- · Planned for privacy.
- · Equitable space distribution, convenient room arrangement.
- · Easy-to-keep wood paneled walls, particularly in hard use areas.
- Ceramic tile around tub.
- · Outside storage.

Furnishings

- · Selection of furniture to fill family needs and activities.
- · Furniture arranged for convenient use.
- · Furniture scaled for room size and available floor space.
- · Effective coordination of textures, styles, and colors in each room and throughout house.
- Accessories chosen to add individuality, interest and/or convenience.
- · Furniture and furnishings in keeping with type and cost of house.

Open House

See the House of Wood 1968 during Fair Week between hours of 9:00 A.M. and 10:00 P.M. Your hosts will be Agricultural Extension agents from counties nearest Raleigh. Specialists from the wood industry and the Agricultural Extension Service will also be available to answer technical questions.

Construction

- · Properly engineered to be structurally sound.
- · Built to comply with or exceed building code standards.
- · Floor joists and subfloor pressure treated to prevent termite and rot damage.
- Quality southern yellow pine lumber that is used in framing, textured siding, floors, and trim is grade marked, kiln dried (pre-shrunk) and manufactured to highest industry standards.
- · Fully insulated walls, floors, and ceilings.
- · A 200 amp electric service provided for air conditioner, freezer and electric heat.
- Resilient wood floors for life of the house.
- · Vapor barrier on ground and walls to reduce condensation problems.
- · Continuous masonary foundation wall for support, warmth, and appearance.

Landscaping

- · Grade slopes from house.
- · Open lawn area in front.
- · Slow-growing evergreen shrubs combined with evergreen ground cover.
- · Shrubbery placed to emphasize the doorway and to soften corners of house.
- Plantings in front of low fence on property line.

Costs

The House of Wood 1968 constructed on your lot is estimated to cost \$9,500-\$11,000, depending upon area of the state, contractor, materials specified, and modifications to the basic plan.
